### SPECIAL AGENT ADRIANNA M. VORDERBRUGGEN

Special Agent (Major) Adrianna M. Vorderbruggen graduated from Wayzata High School, Plymouth, Minn., in 1998. She began her career at the United States Air Force Academy where she graduated in May 2002 with a bachelor of science degree in Behavioral Sciences and received her commission as a second lieutenant. She was selected for duty as an AFOSI Special Agent. In February 2003, SA Vorderbruggen graduated from the U.S. Air Force Special Investigations Academy at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, Brunswick, Ga.



Her first assignment in AFOSI was at Detachment 802, Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., where she was the unit's counterintelligence program manager and responsible for much of the southeastern United States, the Caribbean Islands, and Central and South America. During this time, she deployed to Tallil Air Base, Iraq, as the collections and source recruitment manager where she was instrumental in the capture of Saddam Hussein's son's "right-hand," who was responsible for killing U.S. and Iraqi military personnel.

Returning from her combat deployment in 2005, SA Vorderbruggen transferred to AFOSI Detachment 305, McChord Air Force Base, Wash., where she served as the operations officer. In 2007, she was selected for her first detachment commander position at AFOSI Detachment 225, Holloman Air Force Base, N.M. In 2009, she was selected as an Air Force Institute of Technology student in Forensic Sciences and attended George Washington University in Washington, D.C., where she obtained her Master of Forensic Sciences degree.

SA Vorderbruggen then served as the forensic science consultant for the northeastern U.S. region between 2010 and 2013 with the 2nd Field Investigations Squadron, Andrews Air Force Base, Md. From there she was assigned to the 9th Field Investigations Squadron as the operations officer at Hurlburt Field, Fla., and was selected to command AFOSI Expeditionary Detachment 2405 at Bagram Air Base, Afghanistan, in 2015.
